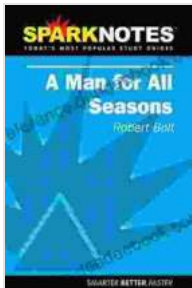

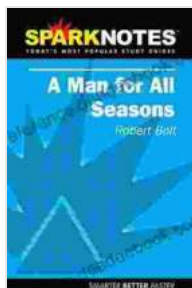
- **Conscience:** More's refusal to sign the Act of Supremacy is based on his conscience. He believes that it is wrong to go against his beliefs, even if it means death.

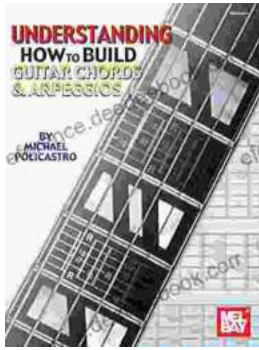
